**From Cults to Cultures: *Bridges, Grounded, and Transitions* as a Case Study in a New Evangelical Paradigm on New Religions**

In the Christendom context of previous decades, evangelicals approached adherents of new religions as cults and heretical systems and largely utilized an apologetic contrast and confrontation approach. More recently, evangelicals have developed a cross-cultural missions approach that considers not only the significance of theology and apologetics, but also the history of missions, missiology, as well as the insights of sociology of religion and religious studies. This seminar will discuss this new paradigm among evangelicals and will consider examples from the *Bridges, Grounded, and Transitions* resources of the Western Institute for Intercultural Studies as illustrations of this model.

**Together in Story; Holistic Proclamation**

#### **I Am Dobson: Converting Societal Structures**

The Evangelical Christian movement has concerned itself with lifestyle evangelism on a person-to-person basis, but by and large has not brought lifestyle evangelism into the discussion of changing societal structures. This is illustrated in the iconic significance of leading Evangelical figures, such as Dr. James Dobson. Many in our society view these Evangelical Christian leaders as not being concerned for compassionate and sacrificial coexistence and loving their enemies. As difficult as this perception may be for many of us as Christ-followers to recognize and engage, we must understand that it is not simply what we say that matters, but also what we communicate to people. We must repent as a movement for those times when we have not been redemptive. Furthermore, we must become more intentional about converting societal structures through sacrificial coexistence if we are to reach all our neighbors with the love of Christ. To the extent we do these things, we will foster lifestyle evangelism in a truly redemptive way in the public square.
